SMC says Farewell to Dr. Colleen Perry Keith



Dr. Colleen Perry Keith, President of Spartanburg Methodist College since 2009, has been named president of Pfeiffer University by the trustees of the Misenheimer, North Carolina college. Pfeiffer also has campuses in Charlotte and Raleigh-Durham and is a sister college in the United Methodist connection. Keith will begin her duties on July 1.

"While we are sad to be losing Dr. Keith, we know that this is a great fit for her skills and experience and a wonderful next step for her career as a college president," said Dr. Phinnize Fisher, Chair of the Board for SMC. "Dr. Keith has been an exceptional leader for SMC and will bring her outstanding gifts in administration and fundraising to bear for Pfeiffer's benefit. She is widely regarded throughout the field of higher education as a thoughtful and effective leader. SMC's loss is Pfeiffer's benefit."

Under Keith's leadership, SMC completed a major funds campaign, increased its capacity for fundraising, raised its public profile across the state, expanded its alumni programming, started two new degree programs, and undertook capital projects including the construction of Ellis Hall. SMC's enrollment has remained strong throughout Keith's tenure and the college's outstanding athletic programs have continued to thrive in competition at the national level.

"Anyone who knows me knows that I will miss SMC and my Pioneers. This is a great college and one that plays a very important role in getting students started on their higher education journey. Of everything we have accomplished over the past six years, I am most proud of the fact that SMC is no longer the 'best kept secret' in the Upstate. People recognize the value that we offer and our amazing success rate (85% of SMC students go onto complete their college education elsewhere, compared to 20% nationally for two-year colleges) is evidence that we are doing an exceptional job at implementing our mission. Even though I am moving onto what is next for me, SMC will continue to thrive and provide an outstanding higher education start for thousands more students for at least the next 104 years!"

SMC's 104th Commencement

Graduation is a joyous time to celebrate the milestone of academic achievement. It's a time for family and friends to gather together to show how proud they are of what the graduates have accomplished. The graduation ceremony is a rite of passage that creates lifelong memories. So what's the deal with everyone wearing the same outfit - robes and the funny hats?

> Those funny hats are called "mortarboards because they resemble a tool used by bricklayers to hold mortar. In some areas, they're also called "square academic caps" or "Oxford caps." The mortarboard consists of a flat, square board attached to a skullcap, with a tassel buttoned to the center. Today students like to "personalize" their caps to reflect their personality.

Scholars believe the mortarboard is based on the biretta, a similar hat worn by Roman Catholic clergy. The biretta was commonly worn in the 14th and 15th centuries by students and artists. Several SMC Professors, like Dr. Farmer and Dr. Gloor (pictured to the right) have some definitely "cool" caps that mark their academic achievement!

outfit known as "cap and gown." The cap and gown combination can be traced back to the academic and clerical dress commonly worn at the medieval universities of Europe. These early universities didn't have buildings, so students usually would meet at churches. Because these churches were unheated, historians believe students wore long gowns and caps for warmth.

> Curious about the tassels that hang from mortarboards? In some cases, the color of the tassel matches school colors. At other times, special tassel colors are used to represent particular degrees, subject areas or achievements.

> It has become a tradition at many schools for all graduates to wear the tassel on one side until


receiving their diplomas. After the graduating class is announced, the students then switch the tassel to the other side. After switching their

tassel, many graduates also

toss their caps into the air to celebrate. The hattossing tradition got started in Annapolis, Maryland, in 1912. That year, students at the U.S. Naval Academy became officers for the first time (instead of having to serve two more years as midshipmen) and flung their hats into the air spontaneously.

Since that time, the tradition continued each year, and it has become a ritual at schools — everywhere!





The Write Place

On Friday, the April 10th SMC Celebrated the formal dedication and official ribbon cutting for **The Write Place**, the college's newly renamed writing center, located in the Dr. Edgar H. Ellis, Jr. Hall.

Nearly 18 years ago, SMC officially opened a writing center on the third floor of the Frank Walker Building.

Since the fall of 1997, the center has been staffed by full-time faculty of the English Division who give two hours per week to assist students from all academic divisions (computer science, health, natural sciences statistics, criminal justice, psychology, history, literature, and of course, English composition) with their class writing assignments, but also with scholarship and university application writing needs. Over 200 students visit the writing center each semester.

Dr. Katherine Cann, Professor of History and Chairperson of the Social Sciences Division, and her husband, Dr. Marvin Cann, who has taught at SMC as an adjunct faculty member, were the benefactors of **The Write Place.** It is established in memory of their parents, Harold and Mary Davis, and Roy and Catherine Cann. **The Write Place** serves as a living memorial to the passion, sacrifices, and enthusiasm that their parents had for education. Over the years, the Canns have shared that same appreciation and awakening to the power of learning in their classrooms. Now, future generations of SMC students will benefit from the Canns' commitment to education.

During the ceremony, Dr. Colleen Perry Keith, read several quotes from the book *Give to Live: How Giving Can Change Your Life* by Douglas M. Lawson. In particular, Keith shared Lawson's words

"Change and growth can occur only when each of us accepts the truth that we must all give of ourselves so that we all may live....We cannot heal all of the problems of the earth by ourselves, but we have to believe that if enough of us commit ourselves and turn loose our energies and resources, collectively we can create wholeness...Once you decide you are ready to go the extra mile, you will need to reallocate your time, energy, and talents...Progress and change live only in the mind and the hearts of committed, compassionate citizens."

Keith concluded with Lawson's quote

"Once you accept the reality that a better world begins with you, relax in the knowledge that you will be the beneficiary of wonderfully rich, life-sustaining experiences. Your journey will not lead you down a road of sacrifice and drudgery. With grace and perseverance, you'll get much more than you give."

Harold and Mary Davis and Roy and Catherine Cann would be proud of the SMC legacy they set in motion and the tribute that will forever bear their names, **The Write Place**, truly is at the right place.

Janet Wilson, Chairperson of the Division of Business, Math, and Computer Science, as well as Professor of Mathematics at SMC since 1978 has laid down the proverbial chalk and retired from the classroom. Wilson, who holds both a Bachelor of Science and a Master of Arts from Appalachian State University, was recently honored for her 37 years in the classroom that spanned the evolution from slide rulers to digital technology. Wilson was the SCICU Professor of the Year in 2014; won the 2012 Exemplary Teaching Award from the General Board/UMC and was the AV Huff Faculty winner in 1984. Wilson is retiring from full-time responsibilities at SMC but will return as an adjunct professor of mathematics.

SMC celebrated **Chaplain Candice Y. Sloan's** completion of her Doctor of Ministry degree from Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C. with a campus-wide surprise reception following Chapel on Wednesday, April 29, 2015. Chaplain Sloan, who has served SMC for the past 13 years, is affectionately known as "Chappy" around campus. Chappy is an adjunct professor of religion, who holds an undergraduate degree from Southwestern University and a Masters of Divinity from Duke University Divinity School. She began her recent studies in January, 2013 and presented her Doctorate paper and project on *The Use of Spiritual Disciplines to Help College Students Grow Closer to God*.





Professor Kent Newberry was recognized with the SCICU Excellence in Teaching Award, and awarded a \$3000 professional development grant. Professor of Drama and Speech and Director of SMC Theater Productions, Newberry has been motivating and listening to his students and advisees at SMC for more than thirty-five years. Newberry earned baccalaureate, master's and educational specialist degrees at the University of Florida. He has been honored twice by the SMC faculty with the A.V. Huff Faculty Prize for teaching excellence as well as the Exemplary Teacher Award presented by the

General Board of Higher Education and Ministry.

SMC Professor of English, Dr. Jill Coyle, recently won the Emrys Poetry Award presented by the Hub City

Writers Group for her piece entitled "Walker Creek." Ms. Marjory Wentworth, poet laureate of South Carolina, served as judge for the competition. She said of Coyle's poem, "I admire everything about this poet. The attention to specific image detail is superb and reminds me of Elizabeth Bishop's work. The poems are beautifully crafted; there isn't a spare syllable. What an accomplishment." Coyle earned her PhD in Classical Studies from Duke University and her MA in English from N.C. State University. Her poems have appeared in *Blueline, Avocet, Main Street Rag,* and *Pinesong.* As a result of her award, Coyle, of Travelers Rest, will receive a scholarship to the week-long Wildacres Writers Workshop in Little Switzerland, N.C. in July.

Teresa Ferguson, Chief of Campus Safety, was awarded the J.L. Geddis Award for outstanding service



to the College. Geddis served admirably at SMC for 41 years, beginning in 1964 as a student at Spartanburg Junior College and held many areas of responsibility during his 41 years here at SJC and SMC. In 2007 the college established the J. L. Geddis Award to honor an outstanding SMC staff member each year. James "Jim" R. Epting, Jr. (Class of 1969 SJC) retired after 27 years as Director of Computer Services, USC - School of Law.






On June 10, 2004, Yvonne Harper had little idea of the magnitude of each step she was taking as she lugged boxes of student and instruction files from the Converse College campus to the third floor of the Walker Building at SMC.

Harper and SMC were embarking on an adventure that would transform the Upstate legal community - the creation of the SMC Paralegal Certificate Evening Program. Soon adult students would have access to the education they needed for the legal careers they sought with convenient evening hours, reasonable tuition and practical courses taught by legal professionals.

Harper, who graduated with a double major in business and paralegal/prelaw studies, had worked for 13 years as a bankruptcy, civil litigation and trial paralegal while also serving as assistant director and an instructor in her alma mater's ABA-Approved paralegal/pre-law program in Virginia. After relocating to SC in 1998, Harper learned about the professional legal assistant program at Converse College and reached out to the Director, Liz Patterson. Patterson invited Harper to join their Advisory Board and soon after she was teaching in the Converse evening program. "Then one afternoon in the spring of 2004 Liz called and asked if I could come to the SMC campus and speak with a few folks about how to start up a paralegal program. I had no idea I would leave that meeting with the task of transitioning the Converse program to SMC," shared Harper.

SMC began offering paralegal courses on Tuesday and Thursday evenings in the fall of 2004. "We believe in hands-on practical application. Our instructors, who are judges, attorneys and paralegals, teach in the area they currently practice, for instance, Probate Law is taught by the Spartanburg County Probate Judge," explained Harper. SMC paralegal courses relate to areas of law in which paralegals are most in demand. Over the years the program has offered courses on Domestic Violence and Victimology, Real Estate Title Search, Spanish Communication Tools for Legal Professionals, Alternative Dispute Resolution, Cyber Crime, and most recently Immigration Law.

Fast forward 11 years and 122 students have earned paralegal certificates to advance their careers, increase their salaries, and create better opportunities 66 According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Employment of Paralegals and Legal Assistants is projected to grow between 2010 and 2020. http://www.bk.gov/oot/Legal/Paralegal-and-legal-asistants.htm#tab-6



"Every paralegal student, whether they only audited one class, or completed the 14-course program and earned a certificate, are my 'children' - despite being adults! I hold their hands and calm their fears as they begin the educational process. I cheer with them after they receive that *first* grade, *sometimes after 20+ years of being out of school*, and I LEAP with JOY every time one of them lands **their DREAM job** working in the legal field. I am blessed with an amazing job and I love helping students find their passion in the SMC Paralegal Certificate Program," summed up Harper.




